Town Bills Report

- Town fund = \$44,595.95
- General Assistance Fund = \$77,573.16
- TOTAL in expenditures = \$122,169.11

INCOME SUPPORT

General Assistance

A monthly grant for Urbana residents who are disabled or out of work, alongside support to seek/train for work or apply for federal disability payments (SSI)

- 61 current participants (down from 62 last month)
- 10 are homeless (up from 9 last month)
- 39 identify as male, 21 as females, and 1 non-binary
- 23 applications for General Assistance were submitted during the month of March (up from 20 last month)

Education and Employment Track

- 14 current participants
 - 10 participants are currently pursuing the employment track
 - 2 currently pursuing education
 - 2 medically exempt due to illness/injury
- CTSO staff met with representatives from the Odyssey Project and Parkland College's Support for Workforce Training (SWFT). Staff shared information and brainstormed ways participants could be supported in submitting applications to those respective programs.
 We are grateful for our partnership with the programs and are excited for what's to come!



Disability and Wellness Track

- 41 participants
- Social Security Help
 - 6 participants were awarded SSI in FY 23 so far. (12 participants were awarded SSI/SSDI in FY22.)
 - 17 participants have been helped to date with submitted applications, appeal assistance, GA case management and intensive SOAR case management since September 1, 2020.
 - o 8 SSI/SSDI reconsiderations have been submitted.
 - 4 participants assisted with filing for a hearing in front of an administrative law judge and locating lawyers (if needed).
 - Phrasing in previous memos used "locating lawyers for SSI appeal assistance." The new phrasing more accurately represents the assistance being provided.
- Our General Assistance caseworkers are constantly brainstorming ideas to support
 participants in getting the medical care they need. Having sufficient medical evidence of
 their diagnoses will support participants with beginning a disability claim or adding
 evidence to their existing disability claim.
- There will be a statewide Illinois SOAR cohort training scheduled during the month of May, which is sponsored by the Supporting Housing Providers Association (SHPA). Our SOAR case manager has been reaching out to other organizations to gauge interest in participating. As a result of the training, she hopes there will be more SOAR-trained caseworkers in our community and throughout the state.

Transportation Assistance

- 111 annual passes at \$60 (\$6,660) since MTD began to charge bus fare again July 2021.
- 64 DASH passes, which are free for those with disabilities who qualify (saving Township \$3,840) since MTD began to charge bus fare again July 2021.
- 3 month passes at \$20 (\$60) for participants to use while waiting for DASH.

HOUSING SUPPORT

Rental Assistance

Rental assistance for Urbana households behind on rent or homeless moving into housing.

- 3 households were supported with CTSO Rental Assistance for the month of March.
- We received 32 applications for rental assistance in the month of March (down from 38

last month).

- Cunningham Township is working to finalize a contract for ARPA funds to support expanded Rental Assistance. Such a contract will need to support staffing and direct assistance expenses to be able to have the capacity to manage the grant.
- We budgeted \$125,000 in rental assistance this year and have spent \$115,559 or 92.4% as of April 4, 2023.

Housing Advocacy

Housing advocacy for participants who are homeless or at risk of homelessness to access all available subsidized housing opportunities and move in.

Subsidized Housing Advocacy

 472 participants representing 281 households received help applying to subsidized housing since our advocacy program began July 1, 2020.

129 households have moved in!

Housing First Program

- These are direct payments to subsidized housing providers to keep CTSO participants in their homes. Participants are offered this service who have trouble paying rent regularly and must agree to direct payments and case management.
- 16 participants received the Housing First benefit last month All are current participants.

Housewarming Gifts

- Housewarming gifts are entirely funded by private donations which are used to provide vouchers to formerly homeless households to buy furniture and housewares at Salt and Light and Habitat for Humanity Restore.
- 65 homeless households have been assisted with the Township Housewarming, since the program began in February, 2021.
- 1 household received housewarming support through Angel Donor Funds last month.

Bridge to Home

A continuum of services for homeless residents in Champaign County.

Street Outreach

Services include food, transportation to services, weather appropriate clothing and engagement events.

- Members of the public are encouraged to call CTSO for wellness checks on residents who may be homeless.
- CTSO served 25 households with street outreach in the month of March. This is down from the 26 served in February of 2023.

Emergency Housing - Hotel

If no other shelter option exists, short term emergency housing will be considered as long as the resident is meeting with a case manager, pursuing goals, and seeking permanent housing.

- Last month 8 households (14 individuals) were sheltered in a hotel.
- All community shelters remain full, for both men and women.
- STRIDES is reporting 15-20 residents actively on their waitlist with 5-8 showing up daily.
- All shelters are reporting problems accessing drivers licenses/ID for residents at Champaign DMV. Supervisor will escalate to Secretary of State.

Rapid Rehousing

CTSO provides housing stabilization and up to 12 months of rent for literally homeless individuals and families in Champaign County, referred by Centralized Intake for the Homeless.

- 1 household –had to be exited from the program due to noncompliance.
- 1 household a mother with two young children moved into their new home in February.
- 1 household— a mother with two young children is preparing to move into their new home later this month.
- We still have capacity to house at least one more household in this grant cycle.

Emergency Housing for Urbana families

Emergency Housing for families with children in Urbana schools of Crisis Nursery or residents with disabilities who are referred from CU at Home.

- Total served: 66 households including 75 adults and 120 children (since July 2020)
- Last month: 8 households served. 1 new family entered into our emergency housing. There were no move outs in the month of March.
- Currently 18 Urbana children are being served
- We currently have 1 family on our waitlist actively unsheltered

Housing Case Management in Urbana Schools

USD 116 funds a CTSO Housing Case Manager who works in all schools to identify families that are homeless, housing insecure, or facing issues with rent and provide services.

- Total Referrals: 71 families (since program start 4/21/22)
- USD Referrals actively in CTSO shelter: 4 families including 12 children

UTILITY SUPPORT

Utility Support

Privately funded utility bill support for Urbana residents who face shut offs.

- Dozens were referred to RPC's LIHEAP & the COVID relief Water Assistance, as well as the Salvation Army.
- 1 households received utility assistance in the month of March power shut offs are discontinued due to low temperatures.
- 196 households (\$75,043) served since program start Nov. 2020

Digital Inclusion Campaign

A campaign to supply low income Urbana residents with smartphones, computers, tablets, and internet access.

- Distributed to date (no change from last month)
 - o #Total of benefits: 457
 - # Smart Phones and Lifeline service: 401
 - # Internet benefits: 18# Laptops/tablets: 38
- CTSO now referring residents to Assurance Wireless -

OTHER TANGIBLE NEEDS SUPPORT

Angel Donor Funds

Township facilitates Neighbors Helping Neighbors through tax deductible <u>charitable</u> <u>donations</u> made to our Angel Donor Fund program. 100% of all donated funds support the

unmet needs of local residents and go directly to secure food, clothing, housing, power, transportation or other tangible needs on behalf of residents.

- Over the last several months, in addition to utility and transportation support, we were able to use Angel Donor funds to purchase walking canes, diapers, planners, coats, work clothes, food, a wheel chair rental and a space heater for our neighbors in need.
- Total Angel Donor funds received to date since December 21, 2018: \$264,271
- Total Angel Donor funds received this fiscal year since July 1, 2022: \$37,231

FOOD SUPPORT

Bucket Brigade Food Delivery Service

A collaboration with the Channing Murray Foundation, United Way, and The Hope Center to provide a free weekly food pantry delivery service to low-income residents in Urbana who are unable to access walk-in food pantries.

- Food delivery is meant to be a temporary service to residents while CTSO works with residents to address underlying causes of food insecurity.
- Given that the additional \$92 of SNAP benefits provided during the COVID pandemic ended February 28, 2023, more people are experiencing food insecurity.
- In the month of March, we served 107 households (up from 94 in Feb.)
 - 51 households served by Hope Center
 - 53 homeless households received "hotel packs" from Channing Murray
 - 3 households served by Wesley Food pantry through RIDE United
 - o In total, the Bucket Brigade serviced:
 - 120 adults
 - 55 children




Our Service Area

Discriminatory Practices

REDLINING

The refusal of loans to neighborhoods with a significant minority and foreign-born population.

RESTRICTIVE COVENANTS

Contractual agreements
that prohibit the
purchase, lease, or
occupation of a piece of
property by a particular
group of people,
usually Black families.

PREDATORY CONTRACTS

Contracts where the title to the property was not transferred to the buyer until the last monthly payment had been made. This meant that families could have their home taken from them at any time & without any legal recourse.

DISCRIMINATION

Treating someone unfavorably based on the group to which the person belongs to.



Fair Housing Act of 1968

Prohibits discrimination in renting, leasing, buying, selling, or occupying a dwelling because of a person's membership in a protected class.





Home Owners' Loan Corporation Act (HOLC)

The HOLC maps show how loan officers, appraisers and real estate professionals evaluated mortgage lending risk.

Language in descriptions:

- "Infiltration of foreigners"
- "Colored people moving in... Area is on a downward grade rapidly."






Figure 1. A map of Springfield, IL mortgage lending trends adapted from Mapping inequality (n.d.)



The right for all people to:

- Live where they choose
- Have access to housing (seek, rent, or buy)

Different Kinds of Discrimination

Direct discrimination – treating someone less favorable than another individual based on their membership in a protected class.

Disparate Impact – a policy that is neutral on its face but when put into practice has a greater negative impact on one protected class more than another.

^{*}The Immigrant Tenant Protection Act is a law which prohibits housing providers from harassing, threatening or evicting tenants based on any perceived immigration or citizenship status. This is separate from protected classes in the IL Human Rights Act.*



What Is a Prohibited Act?

A prohibited act refers to an instance in which a person is harmed, or treated differently in a manner that denies them housing, or the ability to enjoy their housing.

Examples:

- Refusing to rent to someone, or lying about the availability of housing
- Steering only showing units in an area where people look the same
- Denying access to certain amenities others have access to
- Charging additional or higher fees
- Requiring different application criteria
- Discriminatory ads or statements



When Is It a Fair Housing Violation?

Prohibited Act + Protected Class = Illegal Discrimination

Direct discrimination: A landlord refusing to rent to someone (Prohibited Act) because they have children (Protected Class)

Disparate Impact: A housing provider refusing to accept disability assistance to pay for rent (Prohibited Act) from tenants with a disability (Protected Class)



When Is It a Fair Housing Violation?

Prohibited Act + Protected Class = Illegal Discrimination

The following are just some kinds of discrimination people may experience.

See if you can spot where there is a prohibited act in the examples that follow.



Is it a Fair Housing Violation?

Mary is searching for affordable housing in her neighborhood. She is unable to work full-time due to her mental health disability. She receives disability benefits to cover her living expenses.

While on a scheduled tour of an apartment, Mary mentions she will be able to put down a security deposit by the end of the week, as that is when she will have the money deposited into her account. The landlord informs Mary that that he doesn't accept any "Section 8 or anything else from the government" for rent.

Is this a prohibited act?



Is it a Fair Housing Violation?

Brianna has been residing at Maple Oaks Condominium for 4 months.

Last Tuesday, a property management team member sent her a suggestive text message. Uncomfortable but not wanting to cause any problems, Brianna ignored the message. Today, while she was opening the door to her unit, the staff member appears, pressing her for a sexual favor. When she refuses, he threatens her with eviction unless she accepted his advances.

Is this a prohibited act?





Disability as a Protected Class

The following is information related to protections for people with disabilities in the United States.

The Fair Housing Act talks about what accessibility requirements must be met so people with disabilities can access their homes in the same manner as a person without a disability.



What is A Covered Disability?

 Mental or physical diagnosis that substantially limits one or more major life activities

(i.e., breathing, walking, seeing, hearing, learning, speaking, performing manual tasks or self care)

OR

discrimination based on the perception of having a disability

What does "substantially limit" mean?

- The individual's disability must limit their ability to use or enjoy their home, or interfere with their ability to meet requirements of the lease agreement
 - An individual who is blind may not be able to read/comply with a written notice unless provided in Braille
- Temporary disabilities are evaluated on a case-by-case basis using the same criteria.

Fair Housing Act: Design and Construction Requirements

All "covered multifamily dwellings" designed and constructed for first occupancy after March 13, 1991 have the following requirements:

Requirement 1: An accessible building entrance on an accessible route.

Requirement 2: Accessible common and public use areas.

Requirement 3: Usable doors (usable by a person with a wheelchair).

Requirement 4: Accessible route into and through the dwelling unit.

Requirement 5: Light switches, electrical outlets, thermostats and other environmental controls in accessible locations.

Requirement 6: Reinforced walls in bathrooms for later installation of grab bars.

Requirement 7: Usable kitchens and bathrooms.



Impact of the 1973 Rehabilitation Act

- The Rehabilitation Act was one of the first laws extending civil rights to individuals with disabilities.
- It applies to recipients of federal financial assistance





Key Features of Section 504 of the 1973 Rehabilitation Act

COVERS

Any housing that receives federal assistance, such as Section 8 public housing, or subsidized housing.

MANDATES

At least 5% of units designed for persons with physical disabilities.

At least 2% of units designed for persons that are Deaf, Hard of Hearing, Blind or have low vision.

STANDARDIZES

As per the Architectural Barriers Act, buildings built for or leased to federal government must be physically accessible.



Reasonable Accommodations

A reasonable accommodation is a change in rules, policies, practices, or services that are necessary for a person with a disability to have an equal opportunity to "use and enjoy" housing.



Basic Principles of Reasonable Accommodation

- Both the need and request for accommodation are based on a person's disability
- Housing provider must be aware of the disability
 - If it is a visible disability, a housing provider cannot ask for confirmation.
 - If it is an invisible disability, a housing provider may ask for third party verification for the requested accommodation



Reasonable Accommodations – Examples







Accessible parking for tenants with a disability.



Allowing a tenant with a mental health disability which affects other residents to get medical treatment before deciding to evict them.




Reasonable Modifications

A requirement to permit, at the expense of the person with a disability, reasonable modifications of existing premises.



Reasonable Modifications – Examples







Widening doorways



Installing wheelchair ramps



Is it a Fair Housing Violation?

Shirley has a physical disability. She is looking for an accessible apartment in her neighborhood.

While inquiring about a unit, she asks the rental office if there is an accessible parking space available and what the process would be to request a reasonable accommodation for her service dog.

The property management staff state there is plenty of parking available to all residents in the back of the building and that it's first come, first serve. Additionally, there is a pet fee of \$75 that she must add to her security deposit and application fee in order to have the service animal in the unit.

Is this a prohibited act?



Associational or Perceived Protected Class

- Protected class = a group of people that <u>share</u> characteristics protected by law from discrimination
- Protection can be extended to those perceived or associated to a protected class
- Example of a Perceived Protected class:
 - A landlord treating a woman who they perceive to be a lesbian because she does not act or dress like a "normal straight woman"
- Example of an Associational Protected class:
 - A white tenant inviting their black friends to visit and a landlord banning them despite any negative issues or interactions occurring





Disparate Impact

A policy that is neutral on its face but when put into practice has a greater negative impact on one protected class group more than another group.



Arrest and Conviction Records and Disparate Impact

- Arrest and Conviction Record status is <u>NOT</u> a federal protected class
- Arrest Record status **IS** a state protected class under the IL Human Rights Act
 - Under the IL Human Rights Act this protection extends to "an arrest not leading to a conviction, a juvenile record, or criminal history record information ordered expunged, sealed, or impounded."
- Arrest and Conviction screening may violate civil rights laws



Fortune Society v. Sandcastle Towers Housing Development

- Challenge to a blanket ban on renting to people with arrest and conviction records as a civil rights violation under the Fair Housing Act because such bans disproportionately and overwhelmingly impact Black and Hispanic households.
- Owner automatically denied admission to anyone with an arrest and conviction record regardless of any factors that would determine if the person would be a serious threat.



Problematic Arrest & Conviction Records Practices

Practice	Example
No time limits	"A history of arrest or conviction by any household member"
Permanent/blanket bans	"NEVER house anyone with an assault/bodily injury charge"
Unreasonably long lookback periods	7 years for bouncing a check, shoplifting, public intoxication, and other misdemeanors
Minimum lookback periods	"A minimum of 5 years"
Unclear starting point	Arrest vs. conviction vs. release



Eviction Records in the U.S.

- In a study done by Eviction Lab (2020) it was found that in a typical year, landlords file **3.6 million eviction cases**.
- When looking at court records across the country, this study found that:
 - "Black individuals made up 19.9% of all adult renters in the counties for which we had data, but 32.7% of all eviction filing defendants."
 - "1 in every 5 adult renters in our sample was Black, yet one in every three eviction filings was served to a Black renter."



Eviction Records in the US

- Eviction estimate 2022: **+3,000,000** renters
- In Illinois, about **72** individuals/families lose their homes every day
- People are primarily evicted because of poverty
- Being evicted can result in emotional, social, psychological, and economic trauma to the individual and family
 - Resulting in struggles to keep a job, care for family, stay in good health, and secure future housing





Source of Income Campaign

Advocates have been fighting to pass source of income protection for almost 20 years

House Bill 2775 adds protection to the Illinois Human Rights Act The bill was signed into law on May 24, 2022 and will is now effective January 1st 2023

What is Source of Income Discrimination?

When a landlord, mortgage lender, or other actors treat households unfairly because of their subsidy, non-wage income, or forms of home financing.

Put simply, this occurs because real estate actors want to refuse the household's legal source of income. The decision can be arbitrary and often serve as a proxy for other forms of discrimination.

Who is Impacted

- Nearly 3,000 veterans who utilize Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing vouchers (VASH) in order to avoid homelessness and help pay their rent
- Nearly 95,000 households who use Housing Choice Voucher to help pay rent
- More than 214,000 individuals who receive survivor benefits
- More than 264,000 individuals receiving Social Security Insurance (SSI)
- About half of all Illinois Households receive income coming from nonwage source

How this impacts people

Clients, neighbors, friends, and family who. . .

- . . . are homeless despite having the means to afford their rent
- ... have Housing Choice Vouchers but no choice in where they can live
- . . . have waited years to get a voucher but lose it because it expires before they find a LL
- . . .can only find already affordable housing options that accept their voucher, reducing the affordable stock for those in need but without a subsidy
- . . . experience rampant disrespect



What the law says

(775 ILCS 5/1-103)

(O-5) Source of income. "Source of income" means the lawful manner by which an individual supports himself or herself and his or her dependents.

Source of Income — The Basics

Effective January 1, 2023

- SOI is added to the Illinois Human Rights Act
- SOI examples:
 - Housing Choice Vouchers
 - Veterans' Benefits
 - Supplemental Security Income (SSI)
 - Retirement Income
 - Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF)

- Child Support

Examples of Discrimination

- •Newspaper ad: "No Section 8, thanks."
- •Telephone call: "We don't take Section 8."
- •"You have to have a job to rent here."
- •"We do not accept Township rental assistance."
- •Blanket policy to refuse emergency rent assistance
- Landlord will not fill out regular paperwork, sign contract, or allow property inspection required by subsidy program
- •LIHTC properties who refuse to accept voucher holders

Examples of Discrimination

- Landlord only discusses background checks for voucher holders
- Landlord charges voucher holders extra for the application
- Landlord insists that tenant buy extra insurance if she rents through a DV agency
- Landlord requires a SSA participant to prove that they will receive income for duration of the lease
- Landlord tells applicant that her credit score is too low but doesn't even run credit checks for people w/o child support income

Is renting to HCV Holders Now Mandatory?

- No. It's not mandatory.
- The law does require a landlord to consider the funding from the voucher in the same way they consider other sources of income the tenant uses to pay rent.
- A landlord may reject a tenant with a Voucher for reasons, such as the Voucher doesn't pay enough or if the particular tenant has bad references from a past landlord.
- To comply with the proposed law, housing providers just have to treat each applicant the same during the evaluation and screening process when deciding to whom to rent or sell.

MEMORANDUM

To: Cook County Landlords and Rental Housing Providers

From: Cook County Commission on Human Rights Commissioners

Re: Source of Income Protections Under Cook County Human Rights Ordinance

Source of income means the lawful manner by which an individual supports themselves or their dependents. See County Code, § 42-31. It is illegal for any person to discriminate in a real estate transaction against an individual based on their participation in the Housing Choice Voucher ("HCV") Program (sometimes called "Section 8"). See County Code, §§ 42-30 et seq. and 42-38. Doing so will allow an injured HCV holder to file a complaint with the Cook County Commission on Human Rights. The Commission can impose significant fines for substantiated violations as well as award damages and impose injunctive relief to the injured party. Id. at § 42-34(c).

A landlord or property manager may not refuse to rent to a tenant because they are using an HCV. Landlords and property managers shall not:

- Advertise that they are not renting to HCV or Section 8 tenants;
- Refuse to process, or delay processing, a potential tenant's application (including but not limited to paperwork and inspections) because of use of an HCV;
- Treat HCV holders less favorably than other potential tenants by inflating rents or screening HCV holders more stringently; or
- Utilize a screening, selection, or application tool that: (a) is specifically designed to exclude an HCV holder, or (b) in practice automatically excludes an HCV holder.

HCV is a source of income. Accordingly, a landlord or property manager must include the value of an HCV in any screening or rental application calculation of "income." To calculate the rent-to-income ratio of a prospective HCV tenant, a landlord should only consider the portion of the rent that the HCV applicant would be directly responsible for.

For example, a two-bedroom unit is advertised at a rent of \$1,500 per month. The property manager has a policy that all households must have an income of at least three times the rent to qualify for a unit. A household with an HCV applies for the apartment. The tenant's portion of the rent is \$500, and the housing authority will pay the additional \$1000. The housing provider is permitted to require that the tenant have an income of at least \$1500 a month (the tenant portion X 3). The housing provider cannot require that the tenant make three times the total rent for the unit (\$4500) as this would include the portion that will be paid by the housing authority.²

The Commission would rather help landlords and property managers comply with the law than prosecute anyone. Please contact the Commission at the phone number above with questions.

¹ HCV is one example of rental assistance covered under this protection. Other examples include emergency rental assistance and homelessness prevention program funds.

An HCV holder with no income would not be responsible for any rent per HCV program rules but can still qualify for a unit because the government entity in that instance covers all the rent. Such an HCV holder has an infinite rent-to-income ratio when compared to a market tenant.

What this changes for renters

- Can no longer treat types of income preferentially
 - E.g. preferring wages over child support and alimony
- Can no longer refuse to rent to someone because of their occupation
 - E.g. healthcare worker of service industry worker
- Can no longer refuse to accept or consider Emergency Rental Assistance
 - E.g. refusing to complete a application for COVID related rent relief
- Can no longer refuse to rent to someone because they have a Housing Choice Voucher
 - Incl. cannot refuse to complete paperwork or allow inspections
- Allows victims of illegal SOI discrimination to seek justice in court for the first time in Illinois

What to do if you or a client has been discriminated against

- Document it as close to the event as possible.
 - Who you spoke to
 - The address
 - What was said
 - When it happened
 - Save any digital communications or voicemails
 - Save any ads or listings
- Connect with your local fair housing agency

- Punitive damages to deter future conduct

INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT FOR BRIDGE TO HOME: FILLING GAPS IN LOCAL HOMELESS AND HOUSING SERVICES BETWEEN THE CITY OF URBANA AND CUNNINGHAM TOWNSHIP SUPERVISOR'S OFFICE

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered by and among the City of Urbana, Illinois ("City") and the Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office (herein after collectively referred to as "the Parties"), effective on the last date signed by a Party hereto.

WHEREAS, Section 10 of Article VII of the Illinois Constitution of 1970 and the Illinois Intergovernmental Cooperation Act, 5 ILCS 220/1 et seq. enables the parties to enter into agreements among themselves and provide authority for intergovernmental cooperation; and

WHEREAS, the City is in receipt of funds pursuant to the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, P.L. 117-2 ("ARPA Funds"); and

WHEREAS, the City is authorized by Section 603(c)(1)(A) of the Social Security Act and the United States Department of Treasury Interim and Final Rule 31 CFR Part 35 to respond to the public health emergency with respect to the Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID–19) or its negative economic impacts, including assistance to households, small businesses, and nonprofits, or aid to impacted industries such as tourism, travel, and hospitality; and

WHEREAS, Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office is a municipal body in Urbana, Illinois; and

WHEREAS, the Parties desire to enter into this Agreement to recognize the roles and responsibilities for each Party in providing homeless and housing services.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Parties agree as follows:

Section 1. Purpose and Scope: The Parties agree that reducing housing costs for those that need it most are important. The purpose of this Agreement is for the City to provide ARPA Funds to Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office for Bridge to Home: Filling Gaps in Local Homeless and Housing Services.

Section 2. Funding Amount: The City, subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement, hereby agrees to provide ARPA Funds in amount of up to \$658,838 to Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office for Bridge to Home: Filling Gaps in Local Homeless and Housing Services.

Section 3. Funding Requirements: Each of the following requirements must be met to utilize ARPA Funds for the purpose specified in this Agreement:

- A. Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office will conduct activities for Bridge to Home: Filling Gaps in Local Homeless and Housing Services, as detailed in Attachment A.
- B. The project must occur between April 1, 2023 and December 31, 2026.
- C. The maximum amount of assistance from this Agreement shall be \$658,838.
- D. Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office must provide reporting information to the City as required in Section 4.
- E. The City will transfer ARPA Funds to Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office in an amount up to \$658,838 in support of this assistance, available beginning in City fiscal The transferred funds shall be provided to Cunningham Township vear 2023. Supervisor's Office on a quarterly reimbursement basis, based on invoice(s) for costs associated with personnel, facilities, construction, and direct financial assistance. A Risk Assessment Form, copy of the invoicing and documentation for costs associated with personnel, facilities, construction, and direct financial assistance, and Reporting Form shall be submitted by Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office to the City prior to the first payment; followed by invoicing, documentation, and Reporting Form for all subsequent payments. For all subsequent payments, Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office shall submit a copy of invoice and related documentation, along with submission of a Reporting Form by Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office to the City for each additional payment, with a maximum total amount of \$658,838. The City shall provide the Risk Assessment Form and Reporting Form templates to Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office.
- F. Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office shall work towards and report on all *Key Objectives and Measurable Outcomes* provided in Attachment A.

Section 4. Roles and Responsibilities of Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office: Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office agrees to adhere to funding requirements and provide information needed that include the following:

- A. Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office will adhere to the ARPA Funds fiscal, accounting, and audit procedures that conform to the Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) and the requirements of Federal Uniform Guidance (2 CFR Part 200).
- B. Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office will adhere to all applicable state and federal requirements regarding labor standards for the project(s), including 2 CFR 200, Appendix II; 40 U.S.C. 3702 and 3704; and 29 CFR Part 5.
- C. Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office will complete Bridge to Home: Filling Gaps in Local Homeless and Housing Services with ARPA Funds in accordance with Section 3.
- D. Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office will submit reporting information to the City as required by the Department of Treasury, upon request of the City. Information will include but is not limited to: ARPA SLFRF funds spent and obligated (along with documentation of expenses), project status, number of households served, and Impacted or Disproportionately Impacted Populations served by the project
- E. Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office will provide to the City, upon reasonable notice, access to and the right to examine such books and records of Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office. Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office will make reports to the City as the City may reasonably require so that the City may determine whether there has been compliance with this Agreement.
- F. No person shall be excluded from participation in programs the City is funding, be denied the benefits of such program, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity funded in whole or in part with the funds provided under this Agreement on the ground of race, ethnicity, color, national origin, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, religion, disability, or on any other ground upon which such discrimination is prohibited by law. Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office understands that Executive Order 13985, Advancing Racial Equity and Support for

- Underserved Communities Through the Federal Government, applies to the use of ARPA Funds.
- G. Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office will comply with all applicable statutes, ordinances, and regulations. Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office will not use any of these ARPA Funds for lobbying purposes. If it is determined by the City that any expenditure made with ARPA Funds provided under this Agreement is prohibited by law, Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office will reimburse the City any amount that is determined to have been spent in violation.

Section 5. Roles and Responsibilities of the City:

- G. The City shall provide ARPA Funds to Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office in an amount up to \$658,838 in support of this assistance. The transferred funds shall be provided to Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office in quarterly reimbursements. A Risk Assessment Form, copy of the invoicing and documentation for Bridge to Home: Filling Gaps in Local Homeless and Housing Services, and Reporting Form shall be submitted by Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office to the City prior to the first payment; followed by invoicing, documentation, and Reporting Form for all subsequent payments. The City shall provide the Risk Assessment Form and Reporting Form templates to Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office. Funds shall be made available in a reasonable period of time after required reports, forms, and receipts are submitted and reviewed by the City.
- H. The City shall provide oversight as described in this Agreement for the purpose of ensuring that ARPA Funds are spent in compliance with Federal law, and in compliance with the intended purpose and outcomes of the funds and project as set forth in this Agreement.

Section 6. Primary Contact: The City has contracted with the Champaign County Regional Planning Commission, who shall supervise and monitor compliance with ARPA Reports and regulations. The RPC shall also serve as the City's primary contact with the Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office unless the City directs otherwise in a writing.

Section 7. Term and Termination: This Agreement shall commence upon its execution between the Parties. This Agreement may be terminated by either party upon a thirty-day notice in writing to the other party. Upon termination, Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office shall provide to the City an accounting of the ARPA Funds and shall remit unspent ARPA Funds to the City. Additionally, if Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office does not spend the ARPA Funds in accordance with the regulations and requirements specified in this Agreement, Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office will be required to repay the City in the amount of ARPA funds that were utilized incorrectly.

Section 8. Timeliness. Time is essential to the performance of this project. Funds not spent during their anticipated period, as shown in Attachment A, due to a delay in the project, or component thereof, inclusive of unavoidable delays, may be subject to forfeiture. Any and all discrepancies between anticipated timeline of expenditures and actual expenses shall be explained in submitted quarterly report materials. A variance of more than +/- 25 percent between estimated and actual eligible expenditures to date shall mandate an amended timeline, agreed upon by both the City and Cunningham Township Supervisor's Office. Beginning with the 2nd quarterly report in 2026, any variance greater than 5% shall mandate an amended timeline. The City shall not provide any reimbursement until the timeline is amended. Notwithstanding anything herein to the contrary, all expenditures and completion of the terms of this Agreement shall be on or before December 31, 2026 and such deadline shall not be subject to amendment.

Section 9. Amendments: This Agreement may be amended only by an agreement of the parties executed in the same manner in which this Agreement is executed.

Section 10. Limitation of Liability: Under no circumstances shall either Party be liable to the other Party or any third Party for any damages resulting from any part of this Agreement such as, but not limited to, loss of revenue or anticipated profit or lost business, costs of delay or failure of delivery, which are not related to or the direct result of a Party's negligence or breach.
